Back in November, there was a meeting held in the office of Dr. Hoffin-the Director of Secondary Education in Edison Township. Attending the

Back in November, there was a meeting held in the office of Dr. Hoffinger, the Director of Secondary Education in Edison Township. Attending the meeting were the Student Council presidents, their council advisors and the principals of each secondary school in Edison, along with Dr. Hoffinger and a representative from Polaroid, Mr. Maccuchi.

It had been decided by our Board of Education that students in grades 7-12 would be provided with Student Identification Cards, which they will be required to show whenever on school grounds or at an approved activity. At this meeting, Mr. Maccuchi showed those attending how to make and properly distribute cards to the students. These cards would be free of charge (if lost or destroyed the cards must be replaced with a \$1.00 charge to the particular student).

There is to be a color coding for grade identification. For instance, a student entering seventh grade will receive a card with a certain colored background behind their picture, and he will carry this card until the end of ninth grade, unless there is a change of schools. Each year the color coding changes and advances one grade so that the student in seventh grade having a card with a gold background will have the same card and correct color in eighth and ninth grade. Each year the background color for the card changes for every grade. (This all sounds very complicated, but you'll get the hang of it).

At the close of school year, ninth graders are to turn in their cards, as will graduating seniors in the high schools. All other students must keep their cards over the summer.



What's All This Testing For?

The DAT tests were given to all eighth grade students this year. The reason why they are given is to measure what field you have the highest aptitude or portential in. It measures how well you do in certain areas. The seven; areas covered are: 1) Verbal reasoning, 2) Numerical ability.

Abstract reasoning, 4) Space relations, 5) Mechanical reasoning, 6) Clerical speed and accuracy, and 7) Language usage.

The tests tell, you what area of work you have the best potential for. But, just because you do well in certain areas, doesn't mean you are guaranted usess in that line of work, just that you have the potential. It!s the rare person who does well in all fields. Usually, boys do better in mechanical reasoning and girls do better in clerical speed and accuracy.

The tests are provided by the National Testing Services and have been in use for approximately twenty years. The age of these tests adds to it's reliability as a measuring device. Percentile is the grading system used on the tests. Your percentile tells where you rank on a test in comparison with boys or girls in your grade. The highest aptitude grade is the 99th percentile. The tests are electronically marked by machines. After they are marked, a score sheet is given out to the students, who then go to their guidance counselors who give them their results. Hope you all did well!!

Save Our Eagles!

"Pow" That's the sound of a gunshot, and along with the shot a beautiful creature can be sen falling from the sky; rapidly to the ground. This, the creature is a haliacetus leucocephalus also known as the American eagle.

Bald eagles are native only to North America and still are present to some degree in the Great Lakes region of North America, around the Chesapeake Bay and some of the middle and south Atlantic states. They are also found along large rivers such as the Mississippi and in California, Florida, Maine, and Northern Rocky Mountain states. There are fewer than 800 nesting nairs left.

If man is to save the bald eagles from complete extinction, he must stop shooting the eagles (and other birds of prey). Man should develope new laws, build new bird sanctuaries, stop pollution of rivers, stop air pollution, restrict the cutting down of trees where eagles have been nesting, increase the number of national widdlife areas and educate the public about the values birds have in relationship to man. People need to care and get involved individually and as groups to help save the eagle and other endangered species.

If you'd like to see this bold, proud, and independent bird soar thru the skies; if you'd like to be able to look at the bald eagle and realize why he was picked as our nation's symbol, help save our eagles.

There are virious ways and one of the best is to join the Ecology Club and get busy. Also, another way which we all can get involved in now, is to start collecting "Fig John" or "Snack Pak" labels. As you probably already know, cartons have been placed in all homerooms for students who bring in labels. There is a competition between the homerooms, so why don't you bring in as many as you possibly can. For every label we receive approximately 15 square feet of land can be bought for our eagles. This is a small but vital start in saving them.
