An ancient Indian mortar, found many years ago in the vicinity of Middlesex Avenue and Prospect Street, has been presented to the Metuchen Public Library by Mrs. William Kingman.

The mortar was discovered on the farm of the late Augustine Campbell. It was used to grind the family grain. Made of sandstone, the mortar measures 15 to 18 inches in diameter and 14 inches in depth, with a bowl-like hollow about nine inches across and four inches deep.
